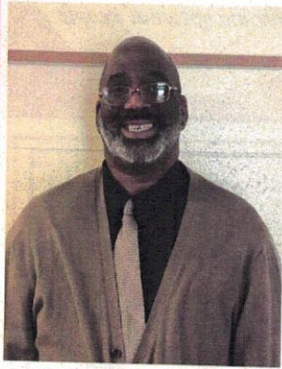

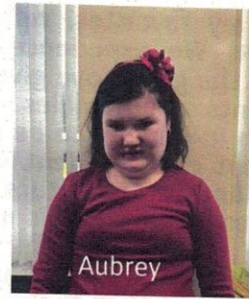


### Lauren Sturnick

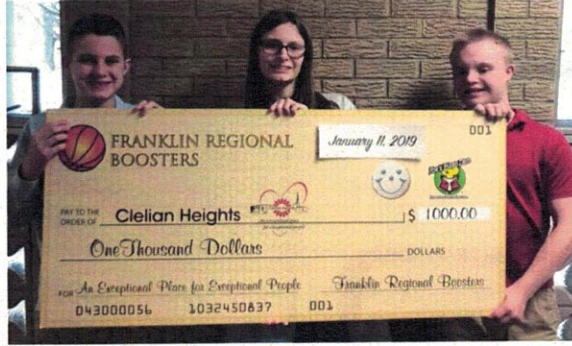
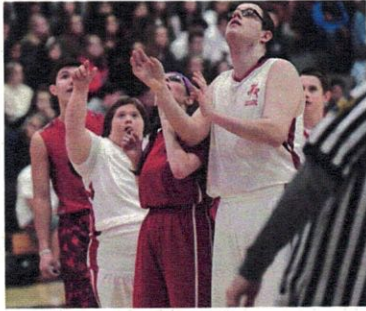
### Safe 2 Say Something

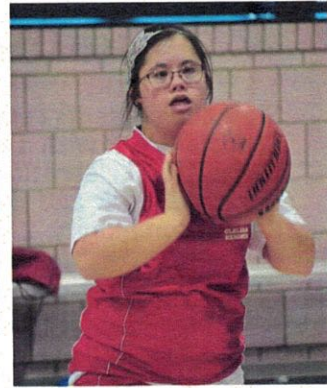

**January 28 - February 2, 2019**

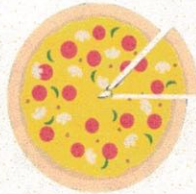

Staff and students celebrated Catholic Schools Week with a lunch-time pizza party. This celebration was to honor the hard work and dedication of the Clelian community.

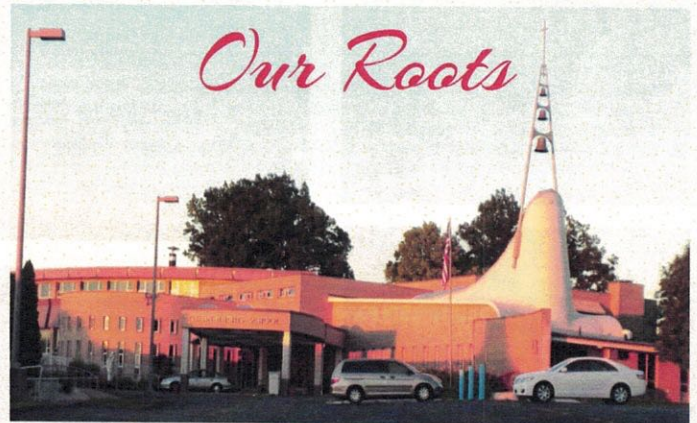


### Celebratory Mass

**February 1, 2019**



The Friday morning mass honored the Catholic heritage of Clelian Heights and the accomplishments of the school community. Students and staff wore red to show their school spirit.



In 1961 the Sisters - The Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus - had an idea to help families help their children who had special needs. It all began with 4 sisters and 4 children. The sisters chose to reach out to educate students with disabilities because, at the time, these children were not included in schools leaving families with little guidance on how to help them. So on the 100th Anniversary of the birth of their foundress -

Blessed Mother Clelia Merloni- Clelian Heights School opened as an educational facility where children with disabilities could come to learn skills that would enable them to have a fulfilling life. Provision was made so that even children who lived far from the school could attend and extend their opportunities for learning by staying in residence during the week and returning home for week-ends. Clelian Heights grew so rapidly that the first school - a converted barn - was soon replaced by a state-of-the-art facility increasing Clelian's capability and program offerings.

Clelian Heights, from the beginning, involved its students and residents in the community activities and, since 1974, with the passing of the Right To education for all Children, Clelian Heights has partnered with school districts, sharing its experience and being a bridge for needed services while broadening its outreach.

Today, Clelian Heights School serves more than fifty students from twenty different school districts, spreading the same message of understanding, positivity, and acceptance on which the school was founded.

### Mission

The mission of Clelian Heights is to provide spiritual, educational, and vocational programs for children and adults with intellectual or developmental disabilities that enhance their quality of life and maximize their potential for independent living.

### Vision

The vision of Clelian Heights is an atmosphere of choice, mutual acceptance, respect, and love that will make a lasting difference in the lives of the person with intellectual or developmental disabilities.

### Non-Discrimination

Clelian Heights offers services to all without discrimination of the basis of race, color, age, religious creed, disability, sex, ancestry, or national origin.
