

calendar now for the Fourth Annual Night at the Races scheduled for **February 26, 2005.**




FOCHO NEWS LONGABERGER BASKET BASH

SPEAKER Dr. Robert Lowry will give a presentation on "The Craniosacral System" on Sunday, April 24, 2004 at 7:00 p.m. The following is a brief overview of what will be covered. The craniosacral system begins at the head and ends at the sacrum which is more commonly known as the tailbone. The fluid which surrounds the brain and spine called cerebral spinal fluid flows through this system. This flow results in a pulsating or rhythm that can be detected by palpating, feeling, the bones. When abnormal movement is felt and there is a restriction in the flow, pain results somewhere in the body. These imbalances can cause sensory, motor and neurological dysfunction.

GRADUATION CELEBRATIONS Our three graduates, Jessica Robb, Randy Rose and Steven Fagan received the "royal treatment" the week prior to











SPRING GARDEN PROJECT This spring, three



teachers at Clelian
Heights teamed to
create a school
garden. Mrs. Betty
McCormick,
Mrs. Stephanie
Sunder, and

Fr. Philip collaborated on the project, designed to provide students in their classes with a unique experience to develop a variety of skills while enjoying time outdoors. The new garden, which comprises approximately 680 square feet adjacent to the playground, developed in a series of stages. After the grounds crew cleared the plot, the personal and social development classes practiced teamwork turning the soil. Mrs. Sunder's workshop classes learned new work skills, by preparing the soil, and amending the ground with compost. While the plot was being prepared, Fr. Philip's listening skills classes learned about the life cycle of plants as they started seeds indoors for later transplanting.

Once a garden fence was installed, planting began in earnest. Some classes planted beds with lettuce and spinach, while others planted onion and garlic sets, and still others completed the planting, setting out the pumpkins, cucumbers, gourds, pole beans and tomato plants that they started indoors. To help students appreciate the colors and beauty in nature, two types of sunflowers, zinnias, and marigolds were planted along the perimeter of the garden and at the ends of the rows.

Throughout the spring, classes made daily trips to inspect the garden, taking turns with maintenance tasks, including watering and weeding. By sharing responsibilities for garden upkeep, students are learning responsibility, as well as having fun in the sun. Students are learning more than just social skills and good work habits. The garden project has also integrated well with

academic areas of the curriculum. For example, planning for the garden provided room 103 with practice in counting money. After practicing counting money in math class, the student made a field trip to the Plants N' More garden center in Latrobe where they were provided with a tour of the facility and learned about planting through a hands-on experience. Additionally, each student had the opportunity to count out the money to buy a pack of sees for the garden. The garden project also provided links to Language Arts. The listening skills classes combined their portion of the garden project with a thematic unit utilizing the Beatrix Potter literature, which provided opportunities to develop aural comprehension skills.

Among the many benefits that the teachers saw in undertaking the school garden is that it will enable them to carry a common project across several seasons. Because the garden was planted later in the spring than most gradners begin their work, the vegetable plants should be ready to harvest when the students return in the fall. Additionally, students attending the Extended School Year Program in July will have the opportunity to experience the garden when it is at its peak growth. During June and August, when the students are on summer break, Mrs. McCormick, Mrs. Sunder, and Fr. Philip will share responsibility for garden maintenance and care.
