

## Charles and Cecelia Decker

Charles and Cecelia Decker became aware of Clelian Heights in 1961 when their son Charles Henry Decker Jr. was born. 'Chip' was enrolled in 1966 and the Deckers became actively involved in life at Clelian Heights. Charles became the Scout Master of Clelian Heights' Boy Scout Troop #413. It was the first special education troop to camp at Camp Conestoga for a full week of camping. A trip that he would repeat for ten years! Cecelia, a registered nurse, volunteered as on-call school nurse for many years. Together they also volunteered as drivers accompanying and caring for students on field trips and at all the Special Olympics events. Their daughter Janice also became involved in activities at Clelian Heights. She chose education as her career field and recently earned her doctorate. Janice continues to volunteer her talents.



Charles received his CLU designation from Purdue University, graduated from St. Vincent College with a BS degree in business administration and finance following his discharge from the US Navy. He was employed by Northwestern Mutual Life in 1952 and recently retired in 2010 after a 58 year career. Charles has received the *Service to Boyhood*, Boy Scouts of America award in 1981 and the *Bishop G. Connare Award* for his service to youth. Charles served as a Clelian Heights' Advisory Board Member from 1993 until 2008.

Cecelia attended Seton Hill College and the University of Pittsburgh and graduated from Westmoreland Hospital School of Nursing, where she also became an employee. Later she moved to the operating room as a surgical nurse and then to the office of Dr. Frank Perrone as his surgical nurse. Cecelia was active in the Westmoreland Area Nurse's Association and the St. Luke Society. She retired from nursing at the end of the 1980's.

After a brief illness in 1980, Chip went home to heaven joining his younger brother Todd. In fulfilling his dream, the Decker's, the sisters, and the whole community raised funds for Chip's House - a place where his friends could stay at Clelian, live together, and work at the Clelian Center. Charles and Cecelia have served the community in various organizations including the Boy Scouts and Girl Scouts of America, the St. Vincent DePaul Society, and their home parish of Our Lady of Grace Church in Greensburg. They have been married for nearly 61 years. They are known for their love of family and friends and for helping others in need. They feel that Sr. Celine and all the compassionate past and present sisters of Clelian Heights have left a lasting impression on their understanding of the special needs ministry.

employees. In total, Charles spent 34 years at Clelian Heights dedicating himself to making the quality of life ever better for children and adults with disabilities.

Charles graduated with a BS from St. Vincent College and later earned a master's of education from the Indiana University of Pennsylvania. His teaching experience includes Pittsburgh Public Schools, the Diocese of Greensburg parochial schools, Allegheny County Community College, Seton Hill University, St. George's School, Granada, B&G English School, Jeju, South Korea, Qinhuangdao Institute of Technology, China, Chinese People's Public Security University, Beijing, China.

Currently, Charles resides in China teaching English to adult students at Zhejiang International Studies University in Hangzhou. As he says, "This is my life in China. It is not just teaching English, but living with the people and teaching them how to live with a positive attitude. Many students are trained to memorize facts in order to pass the next exam. I teach them to be creative and think for themselves. It is a new experience for most of them."

Born in New Derry, PA, Charles is an accomplished musician. He shares his love of music and Clelian Heights with his brother, Lawrence, another *Heart to Heart* honoree.

# Lawrence Demangone, M.Ed.

Lawrence Demangone began his teaching career here at Clelian Heights in 1970 by invitation of Sister Celine Ruggeri, the founding executive director. As additional classrooms were needed Sr. Celine was very careful in her selection of staff. She was very impressed with the Demangone family's involvement in education and the family values they lived. She was pleased to welcome Lawrence and later, Charles, to the growing faculty.

Lawrence has dedicated the past 41 years to this special ministry at Clelian Heights. He says that even though he was offered other jobs through the years, he would never trade them for what he was doing here at Clelian Heights.



Lawrence has had several roles here at Clelian Heights. He began as teacher of the very youngest group. He showed tremendous patience and loving, gentle care for each child. He applauded every step forward knowing that success was gradual and needed to be appreciated and encouraged. For many years he also taught all the music classes which included annual Christmas and spring performances and, in the '80's and '90's, accompanying the Clelian Singers on the road. He still continues as school organist for weekly masses.

Lawrence is presently a training specialist and job coach in the Clelian Center where he continues to show that same patience, encouragement, and love that he is known for. He takes great satisfaction from seeing his former students continuing to mature and succeed as responsible adults.

Lawrence went to St. Vincent Prep and then earned a BA in music education from St. Vincent College. He did graduate work in music at Duquesne University and later earned a master's degree in special education there.

Lawrence lives in New Derry and like his brother Charles, is an accomplished musician. He became a parish organist at age 13 playing 3 masses a day for seven years at St. Simon and Jude parish in Blairsville, PA. and continuing his music ministry through the years. He now plays at St. Vincent and St. John the Baptist parishes in Latrobe. He has shared his talent with numerous parishes around the Diocese of Greensburg and in the Pittsburgh area as well.

director. She is a graduate of Albertus Magnus College, New Haven, Connecticut.

Dewey is a hands-on person who likes challenges and so he has involved himself in both facilities maintenance and computer technology. Dewey assists wherever needed with special facilities projects calling for patience and know how. He also oversees all Chip's House maintenance. In addition, he is the IT person for Clelian Heights. His responsibilities include all software upgrades, technology purchases and installations for both the MAC and PC operations. 

Rathgeb Dairy provided milk and even calves (one named Vincent De Paul) to Clelian Heights when it first opened in 1961. It was his father who first introduced him to the pioneer sisters who began the ministry.

Monsignor Rathgeb became Clelian Heights' chaplain 30 years later while serving in the diocesan Tribunal. He resided at Clelian for 13 years until his present assignment to Caritas Christi Center as chaplain.

Monsignor continues to serve on Clelian Heights Advisory Board. He says his experiences at Clelian Heights gave him the opportunity to become very close to God's very special people including the sisters and the staff. He often returns to visit and celebrate Mass as time permits. He considers Clelian Heights to be one of the important treasures of the Diocese. "It's daily ministry is to serve the needs of very special people whose love and appreciation is a real example to us of the beauty of Christian living."
