The school is not a custodial care nor a permanent placement institution.


Clelian Heights School has only two sources of income — tuition payments and private charitable gifts. It does not receive public money of any kind.



#### Aims Of Clelian Heights' School

Clelian Heights' School is dedicated to helping handicapped children become happy useful members of adult society, within the limits of their capabilities. This requires maximum development of each child's potential. Curriculum and training are designed to implement the following objectives:

- 1. Religious training to promote spiritual and moral growth.
- 2. Maximum adequacy in the essential academic subjects.
- 3. Development of social and personal skills to promote acceptable human relations.
- 4. Training in civic responsibilities.

The academic program is planned to meet the individual needs of the children, and includes religion. reading, spelling, arithmetic, oral language, and speech training and correction.

Clelian Heights' School offers a combined program of spiritual, academic, social and personal opportunities for the growth of all its children.







In April, 1961, The Missionary Zelatrices of the Sacred Heart purchased a 44 acre tract of land in Greensburg, Pennsylvania for the purpose of establishing a school for mentally retarded children.

In October of the same year Clelian Heights School took its place among the schools dedicated to the education and training of America's most forgotten child — the mentally retarded child.

In 1962 the enrollment at Clelian Heights had reached its maximum capacity and of course plans for a larger and better school were talked about. The prospects of these plans materializing remained a dream because of the lack of financial aid.
