


On May 31st, 1992 Clelian Heights broke ground for phase one of a two phase \$3.6 million expansion. Now, a year later, on May 23, we dedicated two new apartment buildings—residences for adults with disabilities.

Seeing the need to reach out to adults with developmental disabilities, Clelian Heights has extended its services and now, as part of its long-range plans, has begun to expand its facilities so that it can continue to adequately provide for adults with developmental disabilities. The immediate need was to replace the 18-bed women's group residence, the "white house", with two efficiency apartment buildings so that the program

for training in independent living skills could be made more effective. The apartments are designed in such a way that they accommodate the supervision and training needs of those who, up to now, have not had the opportunity for independent living training, while also providing for those ready for more independent living.


As a pledge of continued commitment to the changing needs of persons with disabilities, Clelian Heights initiated a residential (Phase I) and recreational / therapeutic (Phase II) expansion project at its 30th anniversary celebration in November, 1991. It was the beginning of what is to be a three-year special capital campaign effort initiated by the Sisters, the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, who operate Clelian Heights. It will culminate, hopefully, with a groundbreaking for Phase II in November 1994 which celebrates the Centennial



CENTENNIAL CELEBRATION BREATHTAKING

The Sisters at Clelian Heights, the Apostles of the Sacred Heart of Jesus, began the commemoration of their Centennial Year with a Liturgy of Thanksgiving in combination with the Dedication of the new adult residences on May 23.

so beautiful...Amazing!...It was perfect...the trumpet, the violin, the timpani-wow!...the apartments are beautiful...What a view!...How fortunate they are...How happy they must be...Is there one for me?... Fabulous!...So lovely and so special...That Bishop is so nice...I can't wait to see Phase-II...It was so good to see Bishop Connare!'

This Centennial celebration is the beginning of a Province-wide year of events and activities commemorating the founding of the Congregation. One century ago, in Italy, Clelia Merloni boldly responded to the devotion of the Sacred Heart unfolding in the Chruch of her time by founding this religious community. As Clelia envisioned, the call was expressly to serve in diverse forms of charitable works. By this witnessing the Apostle would be able to give a human face to the love of God.

The first Apostles came to the United Sates in response to the growing needs of the immigrant Church in America. In 1909, the first Provincialate/Novitiate was established in Connecticut. From

this beginning on the East Coast, the Apostles have responded to the needs of 14 dioceses in Connecticut, New York, New Jersey, Rhode Island, Pennsylvania, Florida, Missouri, and California.

Apostles presently carry out their apostolic efforts in Italy, Switzerland, Albania, Brazil, Argentina, Chile and the United States. Apostles in the United States seeking to make the Heart of Christ known and loved in society today, minister in the following areas: education, day-care, health care, legal services, parish and diocesan ministry.

Locally, the Apostles have served in the Diocese of Pittsburgh for 72 years and the Diocese of Greensburg for 32 years. In 1921 they accepted the call to mission in the Pittsburgh Diocese at St. Anthony Village, a newly founded orphanage in Oakmont. In 1953, the sisters worked with the diocese in the conversion of the Village to a Diocesan school for exceptional children and remained there until 1970.

At Our Lady of Loretto, the sisters serve in administration and teaching ministries. Here at Clelian Heights the sisters own and operate the day and residential school for children with developmental disabilities and a residential program and vocational training center for young adults.

This centennnial year hopes to com-



memorate the faith, dedication and service of all Apostles of the Sacred Heart: to celebrate Clelia Merloni's charism alive in the Church: to communicate the Love of the Heart of Christ, and to contemplate more effective ways of making

Christ better known, loved and served.


THANKS FOR YOUR EFFORTS...

SCHOOL CHOICE AND TUITION



There has long been a movement in Pennsylvania to enact a School CHOICE bill (the GI Bill for Kids) that would give financial assistance to parents who send their children to any nonpublic school. .The School Choice bills have been introduced in the House (House Bill 1655) and in the Senate (Senate Bill 1090). The financial assistance, called Educational Opportunity Grants, would pay for 90% of tuition up to a maximum of \$700.00 per child per year in elementary school and \$1,000 per student in high school. (The cost of educating a student in the public schools in Pennsylvania is currently around \$7,000 per student. Obviously school choice legislation, which will help preserve the right of parents to select a nonpublic school for their child's education, will help save the taxpayer in Pennsylvania in the long-run. CLEARLY it is better for the government to spend \$700 or \$1,000 per student rather than \$7,000 per student!)

The bill would also allow parents to choose any public school inside or outside their district, space permitting. Religious and other nonpublic schools would continue to operate free of government or state interference. They would be required to meet the state compulsory educational requirements, which they currently do.

School CHOICE legislation came within a few votes of passing before. If you want School CHOICE legislation to pass, you need to: (1) Let legislators and candidates know that you want School CHOICE and the Educational Opportunity Grants; (2) Support the legislators and candidates who are for the bill with your vote and in other ways; (3) Enlist the help of other parents and concerned citizens. Educational justice/CHOICE will happen only if YOU make it happen.

It is long overdue that parents receive Education Opportunity Grants as a small measure of fairness in the use of their tax money for the benefit of their own children. For too long parents have been paying double to give their children a good and value-oriented education. Catholic schools alone save local and state taxpayers over a billion dollars a year.

Although there will be a price tag for school choice when the program begins, the lack of school choice is already costing the taxpayer significantly. When 3% of nonpublic school students transfer from nonpublic to public school, the cost to the taxpayer is approximately \$60 million. Such transfers have been occurring, largely brought about by economic pressures (it is impossible for many taxpayers to bear the double burden of both public school taxes and private school tuition). Hence, the lack of school choice is already costing the Pennsylvania taxpayers millions of dollars each year.

Although many approaches have been used in trying to bring about educational improvement, such as increased funding, changing certification requirements, changing curriculum requirements, adding staff, etc., significant improvement has not occurred - and, as a matter of fact, scores generally show that students in Pennsylvania and in this country are getting further behind students in other countries around the world. Obviously, this does not bode well for the future. School choice will help bring about educational improvement. It has worked where it has been tried.




