

Sr.Natalie Aiazzi

Today, we Apostles have another Sister in heaven and, all of us have another friend there. I speak of Sr. Natalie as a friend to each of us because, when you think about it, wasn't it true that whatever your acquaintance with Sr. Natalie, she talked with you and listened as if you were a close friend? Sr. Natalie never got too caught up in her own thoughts to notice another's need. She was never too busy to pause and hold a conversation, to greet a child and inquire about how they were. She attended, not only her own inner needs, but was aware of the needs of others. That was a very special gift.

Sr. Natalie noticed and was sensitive to cues that said something about what was going on with us. Attending means being in touch, diakonos, in Greek, which is the technical term for ministry. I believe that the attention Sr. Natalie gave was true Christlike ministry. Her touch was attentive and it was also healing because it sprang from deep within her, from her nurturing heart, from her growing faith and trust in God's healing plan for everyone.

Sr. Natalie's was a heart that more and more made room for God's touch and attention. I know that she built some time into each day to be alone in quiet. It seemed that more and more she stole private moments of quiet, somehow sensing the need for inner listening, for reflection. It is not possible to expect anyone to listen to us all of the time. But, very often, that was asked of Sr. Natalie as each child sought attention for their small hurt that went beyond a physical need. That was really a need to be specially noticed, somehow specially privileged, and touched.


Sr. Natalie had developed that kind of inner quiet that this listening and nurturing touch demands. Every child was "sweety" or "honey" when they came to Sr. Natalie. They were both aware of what the hurt needing special care was but, what really mattered, was the attention and love that would be received from her. This was Sr. Natalie's real worth to us. It went far beyond State Certification that attested to professional ability to assist in physical healing. It went deep to touch the emotional, psychic, and spiritual within and bring it to a renewed wellness. It touched, not just the children who were her aim of ministry, but it touched each of us and we will miss that.

Day after day, year after year, Sr. Natalie dedicated her life to God and to service to His people. The feelings we have for her, the tears and sadness we

experience witness to that. As many of you expressed: "She listened to me, not just my child. She was like a mother to me. She felt with me, even cried with me. She understood."

Sister Natalie always had time for us. What sustained her was her deep faith and life of prayer. Her desire had always been to live for God and be with Him. Now she is. Totally. This is her time to be listened to--now, she is the one being nurtured and loved and tenderly touched by the hand of God. Although we need to grieve for our loss, let us do it with peaceful, grateful hearts, knowing that our loss is, after 85 years, Sr. Natalie's gain. The Sister who crocheted the Angels is now in Heaven with them.


